## Successful Open Day

U3A held a very successful Open Day on Saturday 9 September. ## Special Online Presentations Mary Denver

#### Wednesday 11 October 11am-12:30pm. Dr Sue Colen: What palliative care really is



Palliative care is a topic that U3A Brisbane members have wanted to explore. However, they may have encountered differing views about what it is from friends and family, as well as the medical profession. In this presentation, GP Sue Colen will bring her considerable experience and sensitive approach to the topic of palliative care. Sue will address common misconceptions about what it is, and when we or our loved ones may need it: not just at end-of-life, but at a point in time when it is appropriate to manage symptoms in chronic illness.

"I have spent a lot of my working life in General Practice, but have incorporated increasing time in palliative care, either through my practice, or through my work at residential aged care facilities. Caring for the whole person is essential and palliative

care includes supporting families as well". Sue believes advanced care planning, and engaging with tenderness in difficult conversations, are at the heart of palliative care.

Wednesday 18 October 11am-12:30pm. Dr Anne-Louise McCawley, Caxton Legal Centre: Supporting decisions and choices, keeping assets safe and knowing your rights



This session will focus on the 2020 changes to the Queensland law around human rights and capacity for decision-making. These changes are particularly relevant for seniors, with a new focus on **supported** rather than **substitute** decision-making, and the effect this focus has in situations such as sharing assets with adult children. At the end of the session, attendees should not only know their rights in relation to the issues discussed, but also have strategies to keep themselves safe and their human rights upheld.

The Seniors Legal and Support Service (SLASS) at Caxton Legal Centre, is an independent, non-profit, non-government community organisation that has provided community legal services for almost 50 years. <u>https://caxton.org.au/how-we-can-help/seniors-legal-and-support-service/</u>. SLASS is a free service for all older people, providing both social and legal

case work around elder abuse prevention and education to community and service providers about the rights of older Queenslanders.

Dr Anne-Louise McCawley is the Community Engagement and Education Leader in the SLASS. Anne-Louise completed her PhD in 2007 with a focus on financial elder abuse. She has worked variously as a solicitor, school-based child and family counsellor, research assistant/manager and clinical health social worker.

October is *Cyber Security Awareness Month*, a time for all Australians to improve their cyber security knowledge and take action to protect their information and devices.

The theme for *Cyber Security Awareness Month 2023* is **'be cyber wise – don't compromise**'. U3A members are encouraged to take 4 simple steps to be cyber wise:

- 1. Update your devices regularly.
- 2. Turn on multi-factor authentication where offered.
- 3. Backup your important files.
- 4. Use passphrases and password managers.

Cyber security is everyone's responsibility. We can all do our bit to be cyber wise. Take these simple steps to improve the security of our devices and accounts, and share the <u>Cyber Security Awareness Month</u> resources available on cyber.gov.au.

Be sceptical of all unsolicited emails, especially where money is involved. Even if an email appears to come from someone you know, always check the sender's email address as scammers can masquerade as another person. Be wary about publishing personal information on social media, as scammers often exploit such information to target you.



# Meet our Volunteers Kev Mahoney (Tutor)



I have been a U3A member for 20 years. Initially, I was advised to try U3A by my doctor who said it might help to fill the void that retirement had created. I had spent 30 years as Head of Mathematics at Wynnum North after completing degrees in science and education at University of Queensland.

Looking for a change of scenery, I joined U3A as a class member. Having enjoyed Latin at school, I tried an Italian class, completed one-year courses in Psychology and Philosophy, and was a member of the Colonial Dance class for 16 years until COVID brought about its demise. In 2005, I began taking my own classes. I tutored Japanese in the city for six months and have been a tutor of Italian since 2006. I tell my classes that I am **not** focusing on Italian

conversation because most of us will never use such a skill. However, we can learn to read and understand the language, thereby opening ourselves to a treasure trove of literature and music. I currently have three classes in Brisbane South. There is not a soul who does not join the groups for coffee before or after my classes.

Until middle age I was a keen sportsman, playing grade cricket as well as squash and tennis fixtures. These days I keep active through the gym and a heavy involvement in folk and square dancing.

I find that tutoring gives me a sense of purpose and I get immense satisfaction out of feeling that I am once again a contributor to society. I really enjoy the company of the many wonderful people that I have met.

## Meet our Volunteers Bill Nichols (Member and Tutor) from Rob Hill

Popular long-term member of U3A Brisbane, Bill Nichols, has returned to Houston, Texas, after nearly 20 years membership. Bill was a member of Modern History H15 (now History Case Studies H19) continuously since it started meeting in the Canegrowers Building in Edward Street over fifteen years ago. He attended several other classes including Modern History H27. He was also much interested in ancient civilisations and geology, and tutored in those topics for five years.

Bill achieved two degrees at Texas A&M and worked in the oil industry around the world. He met his Australian wife, Ruth, when they were both working in Russia but they settled in Brisbane, Ruth's home town. Many members will remember Ruth who attended French classes.



Since Ruth's death five years ago, which he has faced with great courage, Bill has been travelling from their former acreage home in Dayboro to the city for courses as much as three days a week. H19 and H27 are both interactive classes and Bill has given presentations in both at least once a term throughout his membership; his last, to both classes, was titled "Who owns the Moon". He had excellent knowledge of history, both ancient and modern.

U3A Brisbane has been well served by Bill as member and tutor. He often said that he owed much to the companionship and learning he experienced with us, but we are indebted to him for his unstinting contributions as tutor, participant and generous friend. Class members gave Bill a send-off at his last classes, wishing him well in his new life with his sons in Houston. He is a dual citizen and we hope he may come back and visit us sometime.
